

MOST DANGEROUS ROADS FOR WALKING

Suffolk County

122 pedestrians were killed on Suffolk County roads in the three years from 2010 through 2012. Tri-State Transportation Campaign's analysis of federal traffic fatality data reveals that Route 25 (Middle Country Rd, Jericho Tpke, Main Rd), Route 110 (New York Ave, Broadhollow Rd, Broadway), Route 27 (Sunrise Hwy, CR-39, Montauk Hwy), Route 27A (Main St, Montauk Hwy, CR-85, CR-80), 5th Ave/Wicks Rd/CR-13, Route 454 (Veterans Memorial Hwy) and Route 25A (E. Main St, Fort Salonga Rd) had the highest number of pedestrian deaths over the period studied.

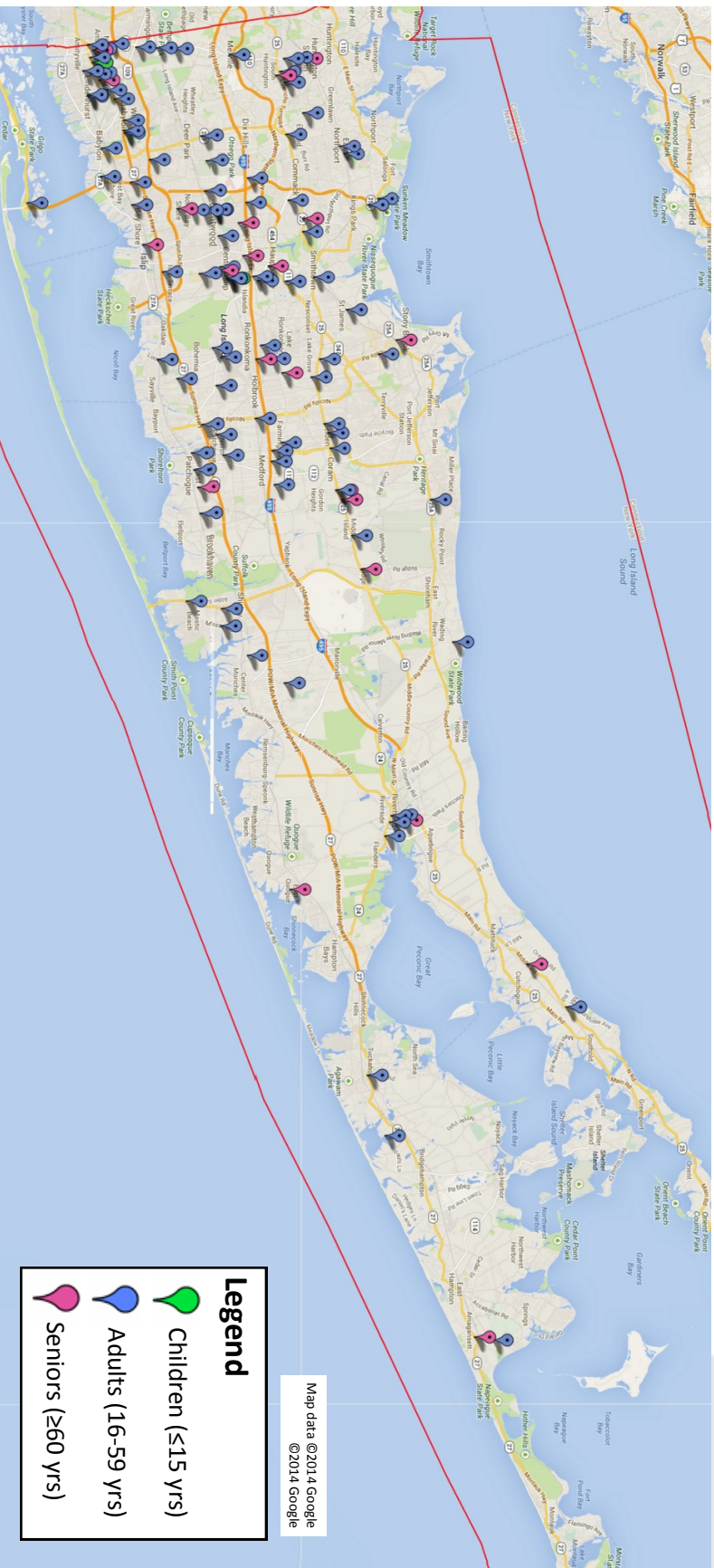

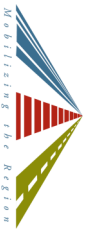
LOCATION OF SUFFOLK COUNTY PEDESTRIAN FATALITIES, 2010-2012
