
# **Congestion Pricing District-Level Analysis** Assembly District 20 – Nassau County Assemblymember Melissa Miller (R)

## **Impact on District Commuters**


- **Only 2.9% of district commuters would** pay a congestion charge because they drive or take taxis into the central business district (CBD) of Manhattan below 60th Street.
- 18.6% of district commuters take public transit and would benefit from increased funding for transit.
- 15.5% of district workers commute into the CBD and 84.5% do not commute into the CBD.
- The district median income is \$52,068. Workers who drive alone have a lower median income than those who take public transit.



Median Income of Workers 16 Years and Older by Mode


